## The genitive case

The genitive case means 'of'.

E.g. **filia agricolae** = 'the daughter **of the farmer**';  
**or** 'the farmer's daughter.'

**insula agriculturalum** = 'the island **of the farmers**';  
**or** 'the farmers' island'
